Three days later, the fish spat Jonah up on a beach. And Jonah kept his promise—he went straight to Nineveh and told the people that God wanted them to change their evil ways.



- **?** How does it make you feel when you think you have been treated unfairly?
- ? The people of Nineveh kept doing wrong, but God gave them a chance to be sorry. How do you think Jonah felt about this?
- ? Did you expect the people of Nineveh to react in the way they did? Why or why not?

**REFLECT**: God treats everyone equally and forgives **all** who are sorry.

**ACTIVITY**: Write or draw something(s) you have done wrong on a scrap of paper, say a prayer to say sorry to God, then tear it up - the wrong thing(s) are forgiven and forgotten.

PRAY: Thank you God that you treat us all fairly.

Inside the Fish Jonah 2

? Do you think Jonah was being a hero offering to be thrown overboard or was he just trying to run away again?

- ? Why do you think Jonah thanked and praised God inside the fish?
- ? I wonder what it must have been like inside the fish.

**REFLECT**: God always provides for us.

**ACTIVITY**: To imagine what it might have felt like inside the fish, collect a variety of different objects that feel slippery, slimy, cold, smelly, and horrible!

PRAY: Thank you God for the opportunities you give us to say sorry

Under the Tree Jonah 4

- ? What do you think was Jonah's biggest mistake?
- ? In what ways, do you think, might we sometimes be like Jonah?

**REFLECT**: God wants us to tell others about His love and forgiveness, not keep it to ourselves.

**ACTIVITY**: Talk about who you could share this with.

**PRAY**: Please help us to see everyone like you do and to love them like you do.



Jonah knew what it was like to be loved and forgiven by God... he had to pass that good news on – so should we!

"Father," the younger son said, "when you die, I will get part of your money and part of your land. The problem is, I don't want to wait. I want my money now!"


It was all the father could do to hold back his tears. But because he loved his son, he agreed, and gave him his share of the money.

REFLECT: Think about God's never-ending love for you.

**ACTIVITY**: How do you like to celebrate? Catch the excitement of the father's joy that his son is back home, by having your own celebration.

**PRAY**: Thank you God that you will never give up on us and will always welcome us back into your arms.
